Larry will explain in his PowerPoint presentation how propagation works and what forces cause propagation to vary from time-to-time.

Larry was licensed as a Novice in 1962, got on the air with a homebrew Viking Adventurer transmitter, and has been active on and off—enjoying ham activities when family and work permitted. He caught the QRP bug after attending Dayton in 1989, and has been active with the Minnesota QRP Society and Minnesota Amateur Radio Technical Society.

Larry received formal electronics training in the Air Force and, after graduating from the University of Minnesota, worked for 35 years as a system programmer at Unisys and five years at Smith Medical.

Joseph M. 'Joe' Clysdale (KDØJCC) died unexpectedly of a heart attack on December 4, 2013, at age 71.

Raised in St. Paul, he graduated from Cretin High School and the University of St. Thomas. He spent most of his adult life here, living just off the UST campus on Selby Avenue near Cleveland.

Joe earned his license in October, 2009 and upgraded to General in September, 2010.

From Joe's profile on the ARRL web page, he enjoyed "Talking With Friends, Ragchewing/Casual Operating, Mobile Or Portable Operating, Conventions, Hamfests, Flea Markets or Swap Meets, Club Meetings, Build-

Joe was an accomplished sailor, and he and his wife Salli had a sailboat on White Bear Lake. During some of his family vacations, he sailed on Lake Pepin and Lake Superior.

Joe is survived by his beloved wife of 44 years, Sarah, “Salli;” daughters Elizabeth (Gary Brans) Clysdale and Karen (David) Scheffing; grandchildren Evelyn, Hazel, and Charlotte. Also survived by three siblings and many loving nieces, nephews, relatives, friends and neighbors.

UST Tobacco-Free

St. Thomas will become tobacco-free beginning January 1 on the St. Paul and Minneapolis campuses.

In the St. Thomas policy, “tobacco” is defined as any lighted cigarette, cigar, pipe, clove cigarette, hookah smoked products, electronic cigarettes and any other smoking product, as well as smokeless or spit tobacco, also known as kip, chew or snus. Promotion, sale and distribution of tobacco products and merchandise, including any items carrying tobacco logos, also will be prohibited on the campuses or at any university-sponsored events.

Book Review

Digital State: The Story of Minnesota's Computer Industry

Thomas J. Misa, University of Minnesota Press, 2013

Anyone who worked for one of the Minnesota computer firms such as Engineering Research Associates, Univac, Control Data, Cray Research, Honeywell, or IBM Rochester from after World War II into the 1980s will find Misa's book fascinating. Much of it is based on archives, manuscripts, and oral histories housed at the Charles Babbage Institute at the University of Minnesota, some of which were not declassified until well into the 1990s. He makes a point that the classification of government contracts allowed few people to realize just how large Minnesota's computer industry really was.

SPRC members will find the following quote interesting:

"Two young veterans of the Goldberg and Demon projects took charge of the engineering of Atlas (at ERA). John L. 'Jack' Hill and Frank Mullaney were fellow ham radio enthusiasts, as it turned out, who met before the war at the St. Paul Radio Club."

The author makes several comments throughout the book of how being a ham operator added to the credibility of being a technician or engineer in the computer field.

So whether you worked directly for a Minnesota computer company, or one of the dozens of suppliers, or are just interested in the topic you will find Misa's book a good read.
