If you are unable to print out this form, include a note with all of the above information with your payment. **Directions to Banquet:** From the Cretin-Vandalia exit on I-94, take Cretin Avenue six blocks south to the St. Thomas campus. The Murray-Herrick Campus Center (MHCC), is off of Cleveland Ave. South, which is two blocks east of Cretin. Enter the parking lot from Cleveland Ave. South, between Ashland and Portland Avenues. Going south on Cleveland, the entrance to the parking lot is at the bottom of a hill. Turn right (west) into Parking Lot G. On the left (south) side, and close to the west end of the parking lot is a loading dock. Take the sidewalk alongside the building, to the right of the loading dock, into the building and go to the elevator on the left. Take the elevator to **Room 304**. Room 304 is toward the southeast corner of the building, in the old part of the building. It is necessary to take the elevator (or stairs) in the old part of the building because the old 3<sup>rd</sup> floor does not hook up with the new 3<sup>rd</sup> floor. Parking permits on campus are not enforced after 6 p.m. on Friday, however DO NOT park at a meter or Signed space.


# Biographical Sketch of Ralph Fedor – K0IR

Ralph has been continuously active in amateur radio since he was licensed in 1961. He cut his teeth on the CW traffic nets in the 60's but is now most active in DX'ing, contesting, and in planning and executing DXpeditions.

Ralph has been to the Antarctic five times, with two DXpeditions to the South Sandwich Islands and South Georgia Islands, two visits to the island of Peter the First, and a visit to Heard Island in the Australian Antarctic Territory. All of Ralph's Antarctic DXpeditions have been named DXpedition of the Year and Ralph was inducted into the DX Hall of Fame in 2005.

Most recently, Ralph participated in the 2009 K5D DXpedition to Desecheo Island in the Caribbean, netting another DXpedition of the Year plaque.

Ralph recently retired from medical practice. He and his wife, Saundy, live in the country near Waite Park, MN. They have four grown children and seven grandchildren. Their other interests include photography, hiking, fishing, and traveling.
